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## Bill Colosimo, Music Director

Bill Colosimo is a passionate and experienced vocal music performer, educator, leadership consultant, coach, clinician, and choral director with over 50 years of active professional engagement in the vocal arts. As only the third Music Director in the 50-year history of The Alexandria Singers, Bill joined the organization's creative leadership team in January of 2007.



Trained at Cranbrook School, Brandeis University, and Georgetown University in

vocal music and choral direction, Bill has produced, performed in or directed over 300 vocal music performances and educational workshops all over the East Coast, particularly in the Washington, DC area, including such venues as the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts, Constitution Hall, Lisner Auditorium, Philadelphia's Academy of Music, the National Mall, Georgetown and Salisbury Universities, and countless places of worship. He's also conducted performances at major concert venues like Nationals Park, RFK Stadium, Camden Yards, the Patriot Center, Verizon Center and convention centers nationwide. Internationally, he has conducted ensemble performances with tours in Austria, Canada, France, Ireland, Italy, and the Czech Republic.

A sought-after clinician, workshop leader and ensemble coach, Bill's passion for music education and vocal performance for children and teenagers prompted his establishment of the Choral Foundation of Northern Virginia, providing vocal music education and advocacy for young people, in 2005. He is currently the Foundation's Founder and Artistic Director. He is also co-founder of pARTners, an organizational leadership and growth consultancy actively serving arts organizations in North America.



From 1991 to 2017, Bill was Music Director of the award-winning a cappella ensemble, The Singing Capital Chorus. He serves (or has served) on numerous boards and advisory committees dedicated to vocal music activity and other performing arts. He is currently Chair of the Leadership Development Committees for both the Barbershop Harmony Society and BHS's Mid-Atlantic District. He serves on Harmony, Incorporated's President's Advisory Council, as an Affiliate member of Harmony, Inc. Bill has served on the Board of the Mixed Barbershop Harmony Association since 2017, and currently serves as the Association's Treasurer. He also is a member of the board of Acaville, an organization committed to radio, tv, and internet proliferation of a cappella music. Bill and his wife, Linda, are proud Charter Members of Harmony Foundation International's Presidents ouncil since its establishment in 2004. He previously served on the Alexandria Arts Alliance Board, the Arlington Arts Commission, and the Curriculum Committee for the Diocese of Arlington school system.

Bill taught music for twelve years in the Diocese of Arlington school system. He maintains a private vocal instruction practice, both in person and online. He is a member of Chorus America, ACDA, and numerous other nationwide vocal music organizations. He is a Dean of the Mid-Atlantic District's "Harmony College-East" at McDaniel College and has instructed at BHS's Harmony University. Bill served as President of the Barbershop Harmony Society's Mid-Atlantic District in 2013-14 and was Moderator of the Society's District Presidents Council. He is privileged to have been inducted into the prestigious Mid-Atlantic District Hall of Honor in 2010.

He currently keeps his own singing voice active as a regular soloist and cantor in the area and by serving Saint Luke Catholic Church as a cantor and Festival Choir Section Leader. 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

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# The Mexandria Singers: A Journey Through Time





## **Grassroots History**

The Alexandria Singers was founded in 1975 by 16 Alexandria residents who dreamed of a chorus distinguishing itself with a pops repertoire, which was then and still is a unique set aside from the many traditional choral organizations in our region. Interim Music Director Nancy Reid was succeeded by Barry Hemphill (1975), then by Roger Oliver (1978 to 2006). Les Cameron became Interim Director in 2006 and Bill Colosimo became Music Director in 2007. The Alexandria Singers have come a long way in their nearly 50 years of performing!

The first rehearsal of the Alexandria Singers was held at the home of one of the sixteen founding members in October 1975. Originally called the Alexandria Community Singers, they shared a love of singing popular music and the desire to combine a concert series with a mobile repertoire for the community. Nancy Reid was hired as temporary conductor.

Their season debut took place under the direction of Barry Hemphill in December 1975 for the senior residents at the Woodbine Nursing Home. They also performed for a general audience at the Alexandria Christmas Tree Lighting. City funding for the Singers followed shortly thereafter.

Mr. Hemphill continued as conductor until January 1978, when Roger Oliver was hired. Nancy Reid returned as accompanist in September 1978. Under the direction of Roger Oliver, the Singers have continued to expand the depth of their musical mission and the scope of their repertoire.

As membership grew, rehearsals were moved to Westminster Presbyterian Church in Alexandria, where they remained for several years before moving to the Lincolnia Senior Center in Alexandria in 1990.

In January of 2007, Bill Colosimo joined the Singer's creative team and today, eighteen years later, the Alexandria Singers comprises over 100 auditioned volunteer voices working towards a mission of Artistry, Education, & Service.

### Where We've Been

#### 1993—Russia and Estonia (Moscow and Saint Petersburg)

Our First International Trip! Fifty Singers, spouses, and friends went on a Goodwill tour bringing medical supplies to selected children's hospitals and performing our repertoire. The musical highlight was a full performance of the June 1993 Show before a live audience on Russia's #1 TV station that went nationwide. The concert was taped & shown several times to the entire country. Roger Oliver led the group at that time!

#### 2015—Salzburg, Austria

This Singer's trip was designed to help commemorate the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the filming of The Sound of Music and those who went will long remember singing Climb Every Mountain a capella on Untersberg mountain in a driving wind, rain, snow and fog. Thankfully, we did have a pitch pipe. Another musical highlight from this trip was performing a joint concert of Rogers & Hammerstein music with 151 voices from several American groups in the famed Mozarteum in Salzburg. Billed as The Sound of Music 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Festival, the famed venue was jammed. The other groups hailed from San Diego, Phoenix, Eugene, OR. Parker CO and Ridgefield, CT. Under the helm of Bill Colosimo, only the Alexandria Singers performed without music.

#### 2018—Ireland

The Singers, under Bill Colosimo, enjoyed a joyous concert tour of Ireland. We saw much of the country first arriving in Cork, spending an overnight in Waterford, and performing in Killarney, the Kilkenny area and the Dublin suburbs.

#### 2024—Prague and Vienna

Though COVID forced the Singers to cancel a planned trip to Spain, in 2024 the group under Bill Colosimo, took a concert tour of Prague and Vienna. The lone concert in Prague was filled almost to capacity with a warm and enthusiastic audience. The final of two concerts in Vienna took place at MuTh, the home of the famed The Vienna Boys Choir. The acoustics will be long remembered.




## Linda Hemphill

I was born into the Singers! Literally! My Mom, Linda Hemphill was pregnant with me while she was president of the group in 1979. In fact, my joining the group was inevitable as my Dad, Barry Hemphill, was the first musical conductor. I don't remember much from when I was a baby, obviously, but I know I was at the Saturday rehearsals at Westminster Presbyterian Church and Mom would set up my crib in the kitchen adjacent to the rehearsal room. When I got older, I remember having my activities bag to keep myself occupied. And then I remember learning the music and choreo right along with everyone and performing it from the audience. I just had to be where Mom could see me. When the shows were at Minnie Howard, TC Williams or Fort Ward Park, I was on the floor in the front. I even remember (vaguely) learning the sign language to a Whitney Houston song! I even used to do the raffle drawings at intermission! Anything to keep me busy.



One of the highlights of my childhood is from the 1989 June Show. Mom and I auditioned as a specialty act for Uncle Roger with "It's So Easy" from Pete's Dragon. We made it! A while ago, we had the recording converted electronically and it's a treasured memory! Once I could reach a keyboard, I became the official page turner. It was often my favorite seat in the house! After I graduated college, I joined officially and made so many friends! I have many treasured memories from concerts, to playing the flute for many concerts, to the unforgettable Austria trip, to turning pages for Aunt Nancy, Lisa, or Mom (among others). I know that the Alexandria Singers have truly shaped my entire being.





## Keys to Harmony

My life with the 'Singer's' has spanned quite a few years. In 1975, I was accompanist for the Alexandria Choral Society, with conductor, Frank A'rujo. With the Choral Society performing mostly classical and serious music, a small group of members ask my opinion about forming a show choir with a much more diversified repertoire; top 40's, music from Broadway shows, and



just overall pop style music. I liked the idea. Having accompanied all styles of music from the classics to Broadway and loving it all, this got to me!! So, I helped them get started by directing mostly from the piano until I needed to return to my other accompanying job with a choral group that met in MD. They got Barry Hemphill to direct and had several accompanists during that time. In 1978 they found themselves looking for a new conductor and found the amazingly, talented Roger Oliver. He needed an accompanist and my name came up. Well, needless to say, I was getting tired of traveling to MD and when he called me and ask if he could audition me, I jumped at the chance. My audition took place in the Lounge of the Marriot Hotel where I had a 2 week stint playing for a vocal trio. I was thrilled that he hired me on the spot and the rest is history.

The 22 years serving as the 'Singer's' accompanist, and working with Roger, Les Cameron, assistant director, and our beloved and missed Linda Hemphill has been a great highlight in my life. Not many accompanists can boast the large "Family" that has enriched my life all these years.

What an honor to be here for the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary celebration. The only one that is not with me is my loving husband Bill who was my right arm and supporter in all things music for 62 years. I quote one of his favorite sayings: "Music is love in search of expression." It truly is and the 'Singer's' have it!!

# 36 Years and Counting

The Alexandria Singers is the ultimate test for Alzheimer's. Mastering 30 songs and hundreds of dance moves in ten months says something about cognitive skills.



This is my 36<sup>th</sup> year with the Singers. We vets have it easy compared to our new Singers. Unlike the "newbies," we know half the repertoire. The learning part is no picnic. Our new Singers always come through, and frankly, our male sound has never been better. The joy audiences see onstage is real. We have such fun up there! It was that way in 1989 when I joined and it hasn't stopped.

Roger Oliver was in year 12 of his 30 years as director of the Singers. I was the lone auditioner that September evening. In those days, we changed rehearsal venues often. Roger took me into a barely lit closet. He softly talked and patiently heard "Take Me Out to the Ball Game," my audition number. "Welcome aboard, Marine," he said. "You're a bass."

Being a bass has its advantages. We're normally positioned between the sopranos and altos. When we're listening and the women sing, it's like being in heaven. For years, my kid sister, Debbie Brill Murphy, attended every Holiday and June show. We lost her in 2023 to dementia.

On stage, I pick a vacant seat and sing to her. She's always smiling back. Retiring director, Bill Colosimo, always allowed Debbie to attend our dress rehearsals. While many musical groups didn't survive the pandemic, Bill's leadership kept the Singers together. Semper Fi, Bill.

Finally, Catherine Cleary Brill was a music teacher in Yonkers, New York. She started all this. Thank you for the music, Grandma!




### Dr. Janghyo Yoo, Collaborative Pianist




### Karen Reedy, Creative Director

Karen Reedy is a choreographer, dancer and dance educator. As a dancer, she performed locally with D.C. Dance Theater and Eric Hampton Dance, before moving to New York where she worked with Robert Battle,

In 2007 she founded Karen Reedy Dance (KRD), a professional contemporary dance company named "best in dance" by Sarah Kaufman in 2011. KRD is devoted to nurturing artists through the exploration of new work and collaboration with other art forms. During the 20122013 season, Reedy was a Metro Arts Incubator Artist at the American Dance Institute, where the company had its premiere of Albatross. Ms. Reedy holds an M.F.A in Dance from George Mason University, where she is an Assistant Professor of Dance.


